The 10 Basic Tagalog Words to Know

Tagalog for Good morning. Filipinos often greet each other according to the

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time of day. These greetings begin with Magandang. Maganda means “beautiful” or “wonderful”, and ng connects it to the following noun. Good morning: Magandang umaga . Umaga means “morning”. Sa umaga (“in the morning”), ngayong umaga (“this morning”), etc.
