Hindu philosophy has a diversity of traditions and numerous saints and scholars, such as Adi Shankara of Advaita Vedanta school. Many Hindu intellectual traditions were classified during the medieval period of Brahmanic-Sanskritic scholasticism into a standard list of six orthodox ( Astika) schools ( darshanas ), the "Six Philosophies" ( ṣaḍ-darśana ), all of which accept the testimony of the Vedas.
